About todays' hymns

Hark! the Herald Angels Sing was written by the Methodist hymn writer Charles Wesley in 1739. The tune is adapted from music by Felix Mendelssohn in a cantata he composed in 1840 to commemorate Johann Gutenberg's invention of movable type printing.

It Came Upon the Midnight Clear was written by Edmund Hamilton Sears in 1849. Sears was a Unitarian pastor in Massachusetts. He wrote this hymn during a period of personal melancholy, recovering from a breakdown after seven years of hard work coupled with news of revolution in Europe and the United States' war with Mexico fresh in his mind. In this hymn Sears portrays the world as dark, full of "sin and strife", and not hearing the Christmas message.

About today's choral music

Prepare the Way, O Zion is a Swedish Advent hymn. The text was inspired by Isaiah 40: 3-5 and the story of John the Baptist, the forerunner and cousin of Christ, who fulfilled the prophesy in the book Isaiah regarding the coming into the world of the Messiah.

The Savior Comes is based on a melody by Johann Franck, a seventeenth century German lawyer, poet, and composer of hymn tunes.

For You, O Lord, My Soul in Stillness Waits is an Advent text is an adaptation of the Advent "O" antiphons, with the refrain being a paraphrase of Psalm 62: 5. The "O" antiphons are verses that are sung before and after the singing of the Magnificat (the Song of Mary, Luke 1: 46-55) during the last full week of Advent in Vespers, the evening worship service of the Church, as a count-down to Christmas Eve. Today only one of the seven is being sung.

The practice of singing the "O" antiphons dates from the earliest years of the Church, and continues to this day in religious communities as well as in congregations whose worship and spirituality are s trongly centered and grounded in the rich history and liturgy of the Church. In these traditions attaching antiphons to the singing or recitation of the Psalms or in other hymns such as the Magnificat provides a frame which reflects and focuses the text of the psalm or hymn in that of the particular season or holiday of the church year.

The term "O" antiphon is in this instance applied because the title of each of these antiphons (in Latin) begins with the vocative particle "O." Each antiphon is a name of Christ, one of his attributes in Scripture, as follows: day one, "O Wisdom" (Isaiah 11: 2, 3); day two, "O Lord" (Isaiah 11: 4, 5); day three, "O Root of Jesse" (Isaiah 11: 1); day four, "O Key of David" (Isaiah 22: 22); day five, "O Dayspring" (Isaiah Isaiah 9: 2); day six, "O King of the Nations" (Isaiah 9: 8); day seven, "O Emmanuel, God with us" (Isaiah 7: 14). The well-known Advent hymn, "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" is based on the "O" antiphons.
