### Welcome to worship. Welcome to the Kirk. Welcome home.

Here at the Kirk, our vision statement is *We envision a world where every heart experiences God's transforming love*. This statement was born from months of congregation-wide listening sessions and years of prayer and discernment. We are already seeing it take root.

We envision a world. In one of Jesus' most famous moments, he feeds the multitudes with five loaves and two fish. In another story, Jesus helps his frustrated disciples to secure a net full of fish by inviting them to cast their nets on the other side of the boat. They catch so many fish that there are too many to eat on their own! Ours is a church that hopes to look beyond our own needs to do what Jesus and the disciples did—share our fish with the world.



Where every heart experiences. Jesus reminds us in his birth, his ministry, and in his promise of the Holy Spirit, that God is near! Throughout the pages of the gospels, we see people following him to shorelines and meeting him there. Jesus was standing on the shore when he called his first disciples, Peter and Andrew. The **shore** is where the crowd listened to him preach and where the disciples met him after the resurrection. We hope to be a church that comes to shore to meet the living Christ! For us, this starts in worship. We hope through our worship, mission, and formation, we will have your eyes lighting up with the reminder of how you and how our community are made well (created), are being made well (healed), and will be made well (saved) into eternity.

#### About todays' hymns

**Blessed Jesus, at Your Word** was written by Tobias Clausnitzer, a German Lutheran pastor and hymn writer. The tune also is of German origin. Settings of this tune comprise today's opening voluntaries, the first of which is by the great eighteenth century German Lutheran composer, Johann Sebastian Bach, and the second by Richard Purvis, who served as Director of Music and Organist at Grace Cathedral, San Francisco from 1947 to 1971.

**O Jesus, I Have Promised** was written by John Ernest Bode, an Anglican priest, for his children's confirmation. The tune is a Finnish folk melody and is named after a province in this Baltic country.

### About today's choral music

The Apple Tree is a setting of an eighteenth century American poem. The song may be an allusion to both the apple tree in Song of Solomon 2:3 which has been interpreted as a metaphor representing Jesus, and to his description of his life as a tree of life in Luke 13:18–19 and elsewhere in the New Testament including Revelation 22:1–2 and within the Old Testament in Genesis. Apple trees were commonly grown in England and there was an old English tradition of wassailing or wishing health to apple trees on Christmas Eve. K. Lee Scott is active today as a composer of over 300 published hymns, anthems, works for solo voice, and larger scale sacred choral works. Based in Birmingham, Alabama, he has served on the faculties of the University of Alabama School of Music and of the Samford University School of Music.

**Today's Cover Art** - The picture on the cover of today's bulletin is of the sculpture above the Kirk Sanctuary altar. The sculpture depicts the boy Jesus teaching the elders in the temple, today's scripture lesson. The sculpture was made by Lee Oscar Lawrie (1877-1963), who was one of the United States' foremost architectural sculptors and a key figure in the American art scene preceding World War II. Over his long career of more than 300 commissions Lawrie's style evolved through Modern Gothic, to Beaux-Arts, Classicism, and, finally, into *Moderne* or Art Deco. His most prominent work is the free-standing bronze *Atlas* at New York City's Rockefeller Center. Lawrie's work is associated with some of the United States' most noted buildings of the first half of the twentieth century, including the chapel at West Point, St. Bartholomew's Church (New York City), Rockefeller Chapel at the University of Chicago, the Library of Congress, the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception (Washington D. C.), and the interior sculpture of George Washington at the National Cathedral.
