MUSIC NOTES

About today's hymns

Christ the Lord Is Risen Today is a translation of a fourteenth-century Latin text. The tune was composed in 1708 and first appeared in *Lyra Davidica*, a Protestant hymnbook that was published in London which broadened congregational hymnody beyond the exclusive singing of the Psalms.

Thine Is the Glory is a French hymn written in 1884 by Edmond Louis Budry, pastor of Free Church congregations in Cully and Vevey, Switzerland. The tune was composed by George Frideric Handel and comes from his oratorio *Judas Maccabeus*.

About today's choral music

The introit is a traditional German Easter hymn which evolved from an eleventh century Easter hymn traditionally sung before the reading of the Gospel lesson on Easter Day and throughout the Easter season. A setting of this hymn is today's concluding Opening Voluntary.

The first anthem, Alleluia, was composed by Randall Thompson, who served on the faculty of Harvard University during the mid-twentieth century. The text of this anthem is simply one word—"alleluia"—a word which comes from the Hebrew words hellēl, meaning "to praise" and Yāh, meaning "the Lord." It is the practice of many branches of the Church to refrain from using this word during the season of Lent so that its return on Easter Day to celebrate the Lord's resurrection has great significance and impact.

Come, Ye Faithful, Raise the Strain is a setting of a hymn written by John of Damascus, an eighth century monk and priest whose fields of interest and contribution included law, theology, philosophy, and music. He wrote works expounding the Christian faith, and composed many hymns which are still used today. The composer of this setting, Reginald Sparshatt Thatcher, lived during the first half of the twentieth century, and held numerous teaching appointments, including the Royal Naval College and the Royal Academy of Music, London.

Botts | Eyekons, used with permission Artist Timothy Botts, of his work, "I aim to make the words look like what they mean, always trying to strike a balance between legibility and expression. Making these word pictures is, for me as a visual person, the strongest way to reflect on God's Word. To share them with others is an additional joy." Today's cover art depicts the joy of finding the stone rolled away from the dark tomb through the use of color and word.
