Welcome to worship. Welcome to the Kirk. Welcome home.

Here at the Kirk, our vision statement is *We envision a world where every heart experiences God's transforming love*. This statement was born from months of congregation-wide listening sessions and years of prayer and discernment. We are already seeing it take root.

We envision a world. In one of Jesus' most famous moments, he feeds the multitudes with five loaves and two fish. In another story, Jesus helps his frustrated disciples to secure a net full of fish by inviting them to cast their nets on the other side of the boat. They catch so many fish that there are too many to eat on their own! Ours is a church that hopes to look beyond our own needs to do what Jesus and the disciples did—share our fish with the world.



Where every heart experiences. Jesus reminds us in his birth, his ministry, and in his promise of the Holy Spirit, that God is near! Throughout the pages of the gospels, we see people following him to shorelines and meeting him there. Jesus was standing on the shore when he called his first disciples, Peter and Andrew. The **shore** is where the crowd listened to him preach and where the disciples met him after the resurrection. We hope to be a church that comes to shore to meet the living Christ! For us, this starts in worship. We hope through our worship, mission, and formation, we will have your eyes lighting up with the reminder of how you and how our community are made well (created), are being made well (healed), and will be made well (saved) into eternity.

About todays' hymns

Morning Has Broken was written by Eleanor Farjeon, an English author of children's stories and plays as well as poetry, biography, history, and satire during the first half of the twentieth century. When this text was first published it was titled, "Thanks for a Day." Scriptural references include Genesis 1: 3; 2: 8, 10, 15; and 3: 8. The tune is a nineteenth century Gaelic melody and is named after a village on the southwest corner of the Isle of Mull in the Scottish Hebrides.

Sent Forth by God's Blessing was written by Omer Westendorf, a twentieth century author and publisher of liturgical texts in English. Westendorf emigrated to the United States from his native Holland after World War II, bringing with him many liturgical texts which he introduced to his parish in Cincinnati. Interest in this music led to him forming his own publishing company in his garage which grew over time to be a leading publisher of hymnals in the liturgical tradition. The tune, *The Ash Grove*, is a Welsh folk melody.

About today's choral music

Let Us with a Gladsome Mind is a paraphrase of Psalm 136, and was written by English poet and author John Milton in 1623 at the age of fifteen when he was a student at St. Paul's Cathedral School, London. Milton was a Puritan, and as an adult opened a school in London and later was appointed Latin Secretary to the Council of State of Oliver Cromwell. At the age of forty-four he became totally blind, and dictated to others his greatest literary works, including *Paradise Lost* (1667), *Paradise Regained* and *Samson Agonistes* (both 1671.) The arranger of this anthem, Alan Ridout, was a twentieth century English composer and teacher.

The Eyes of All Wait Upon Thee is a setting of Psalm 145: 15, 16 by Jean Berger, a German born American pianist, composer, and educator. Born Arthur Schlossberg into a Jewish family, after the Nazi Party seized power in 1933 he moved to Paris, where he took the name Jean Berger and toured widely as a pianist and accompanist. In 1941 he moved to the United States and served in the U. S. Army starting in 1941, working in the Office of War Information Department producing foreign language broadcasts. After the war he worked as an arranger for CBS and NBC, and then in 1948 began his career as an educator, taking a faculty position at Middlebury College, followed by appointments at the University of Illinois and the University of Colorado.
