About today's music

As we celebrate Homecoming and prepare to hear the Word proclaimed, note the many references to our responding to God's call as individuals and as a congregation.

In the Gathering section, God calls us to worship. The Chancel Choir sings an arrangement by Alice Parker and the late Robert Shaw that combines a traditional American text (including phrases from "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing") with an early American tune; on behalf of the congregation, the choir sings "I will arise and go to Jesus." The Song of Welcome, a South African song transcribed by John Bell of the Iona community, "God Welcomes All" assures us that God welcomes each of us, whether a long-time member or a first-time guest. "Come All You People," a song from Zimbabwe, is even more insistent that we are called to worship God, our Maker. Continuing with our gathering to worship our Maker, our Creator, we sing the hymn known well to many, "For the Beauty of the Earth," which includes our giving thanks for the universal church on this Homecoming Sunday.

The congregation responds with singing Charles Wesley's "O for a Thousand Tongues to Sing," a fitting response to our being assured that God has forgiven us. The congregation also joins in the Prayer for Illumination, a time we pray that the Holy Spirit will illumine the reading, preaching and hearing of God's Word with the early 20th-century song, "Spirit of the Living God."

As we celebrate communion in response to hearing the Word proclaimed, the congregation is invited to sing with the choir as soloists lead us in "Taste and See" (inspired by Psalm 34) and "Come to the Table of Grace." These congregational songs can be sung as you move to and from your communion stations.

Our Sending includes the traditional early American hymn "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing," for which some of the text was included in the introit, and "Lord, Dismiss Us with Thy Blessing," a text written by a British Baptist pastor and set to a tune transcribed from Sicilian sailors in the late 18th century.

Pieter Brueghel the Elder, The Procession to Calvary, 1564, public domain

Pieter Brueghel the Elder's composition in *The Procession to Calvary* adopts a well-known scheme for a solemn religious event. Christ's insignificance among the crowds is a familiar device of mannerist painting, as is the artificial placing of Mary and her companions in a rocky foreground. This oil painting was created in 1564 and is currently in the Kunsthistorisches Museum in Vienna.
