

But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord."



What is Lessons and Carols? Quite simply it's just as the name suggests- scripture lessons interspersed with carols. But it is more than that, isn't it?

Have you ever been so immersed in reading a book that you do everything you can to stay in that world just a little while longer? You read the back cover one more time, or glimpse at the preface, or go straight to the sequel. If there isn't a sequel, do you wander the woods of Narnia, or ponder the sounds of Elvish in your mind. The story sticks with you; and maybe that day you might converse a little more grandly or do something chivalrous or sing a little more sweetly that song on the radio. The story gets into your lens, your viewpoint for a couple hours,

if not days; and if your story is a movie, what about the soundtrack? There's a haunting melody that gets stuck in your head- and you don't mind that you can't get it out.

Well, the story of Christ's coming into the world, is one that sticks with you, because it's not just the characters in Jerusalem, Nazareth, Rome, or Bethlehem, it is much bigger than that. Lessons and Carols follows the story of God's promise to mankind through scripture from the fall of man through the birth of Jesus, illuminated by carols, anthems and congregational hymns. The service originated in England and is most strongly associated with the Choir of King's College Chapel, Cambridge University, which broadcasts its Service of Nine Lessons and Carols every Christmas Eve. With the increase in hymnody in the latter part of the 19th century, the church sought to attract pubgoers by introducing carols to replace revelry with worship. The carol, which had been mostly secular in nature, then became a vehicle to share the story of Jesus coming into the world. Dean Milner-White, who began the tradition of the service at King's College in 1918, said of the service that its 'main theme is the development of the loving purposes of God ...' seen 'through the windows and the words of the Bible.'

The story of Christ's coming into the world isn't just Bethlehem and the manger. It is the story of Adam and Eve, Abraham and Isaac, Solomon and David, Ruth and Boaz, and the list goes on for generations. The beauty of this story is that it isn't frozen in time two thousand years ago. It started before the world began, it is still being written here and now, and it will continue long after we are here, because that is how amazing God's love is for us. The story of God's love for us is this epic tale that is glimpsed when we suspend in this tiny moment of the birth of Jesus.

As the Chancel Choir and Youth Choirs lead us in today's Lessons and Carols, we get to immerse ourselves just a little while longer. Let a piece of scripture, let a melody, let God get stuck in your head and heart this morning.



Notes on worship and music

During today's worship we turn the corner from Advent and are heading toward Christmas. We have been preparing to celebrate Christ's coming 2000 years ago and for his coming again in the future. These elements continue as we look forward.

Through the late 19th century, the singing of Christmas carols was normally performed by singers visiting people's houses, and carols – generally considered to be secular in content – had been excluded from Christian worship. In the 1870s, Christmas carols began to be sung in British cathedrals. "...Right Rev. Edward White Benson, at that time Bishop of Truro, conducted the first formal service of "Nine

Lessons and Carols" on Christmas Eve (24 December) 1880. Benson, concerned at the excessive consumption of alcohol in Cornish pubs during the festive season, sought a means of attracting revelers out of the pubs and into church by offering a religious celebration of Christmas."

Today's worship is intended to help you look toward the past to the Old Testament prophecies and move forward into the birth of Christ.

Two texts deserve special attention today:

The Rev. Dr. Thomas Troeger, a minister in both the Episcopal and Presbyterian denominations and retired from Yale, has written the engaging text for *The Dream Isaiah Saw*. Take a couple minutes and read the text closely. It's been set to music by Glenn Rudolph who has composed music for the Kirk in the past.

Another text, *A New Magnificat*, takes some scriptural knowledge to totally understand. You might pick up the Bible or find the text on your phone to read Hannah's song (I Samuel 2) and compare it to Mary's song (Luke 1), also known as the Magnificat. What similarities do you find between the Old Testament and New Testament texts?

Dr. Nate Phillips will present a homily, *Hometowns: The Field of Bethlehem*. How many references to Bethlehem do you hear in today's worship? Now "Hurry to Bethlehem and see the son of Mary!"
