

How did you let people know what you wanted for Christmas?

How did you do it?

In my family, it was a bit of a tradition to sit around on Thanksgiving Day with all of the department store inserts from the morning's paper and draw

circles around the gifts that we hoped to find under the tree a month later. When we were done with those, we moved on to take on the thick Sears catalog with the marker of our choice.

How did you do it?

How did you let people know what you wanted for Christmas - as a child? How did you let people know these days? Did you send some texts? An amazon wishlist? One of my children went to great lengths to create a powerpoint. I'll let you guess which one.

As we ponder the true meaning of the season, perhaps it is good to turn to God's wishlist too. He has been sharing it from the beginning of time. Do you remember the first thing God ever says?

"Let there be light!"

And, even though "there was light," I get the sense that he never lost the hope for having more.

Light has always been at the top of his list.

"Arise, shine, for your light has come!" Isaiah tells us. The prophet is encouraging the community returning from exile to be directed by God's greatest desire - light.

"You are the light of the world," Jesus will, one day, implore us when he preaches the Sermon on the Mount.

And today, as we celebrate this great day of hope and generosity, offering gratitude for whatever we received from our lists, let us remember what God wants for Christmas. He didn't tell us by a phone call, or a letter, or even through a Sears catalog.

How did he do it?

He sent us the greatest light of all. He sent us the light that, as the Gospel of John puts it, was in the beginning. He sent us the light that shines in the darkness and the darkness has not ever overcome it.

Jesus is God's son and our savior, but he is also God's Christmas list sent from him in heaven to Earth to us.

May his generosity to us be echoed in our generosity to him.

WORSHIP NOTES

Notes on worship and music

"At Christmas, we remember and celebrate the nativity of Christ and the mystery of the incarnation. Whereas during Advent we anticipate the fulfillment of the Old Testament prophecies of the Messiah, at Christmas we identify with the angels who proclaimed, 'Glory to God in the highest'; with the shepherds, who were afraid but nevertheless offered worship; and with Mary, who pondered the meaning of these events in her heart (Luke 2:13-20)."

Today's worship continues our celebration of Christmas as well as looking forward to the upcoming Epiphany of the Lord (traditionally celebrated January 6 by the Western church). Our congregational singing will focus the season of Christmas but also offer a glimpse of Epiphany hymns and songs.

We begin our Gathering with the Call to Worship which uses the refrain "Come and worship, come and worship Christ, the newborn King" which we will then sing as part of *Angels, from the Realms of Glory*. Our opening prayer uses phrases from the carol *Away in a Manger*. Following the baptism, we will sing several hymns, both familiar and unfamiliar, from *Glory to God*, giving us the opportunity to enjoy that which we already know and consider traditional as well as singing praise to God with "a new song" as we explore other expressions that might be new to many of us.

We will repeat a hymn from our 8:30 and 11:00 p.m. Christmas Eve services which might have been a new text to many. The text, written in 1996, is sung to the tune of the French Christmas carol *Bring a Torch, Jeannette, Isabella*. We celebrate "Love is the gift of Christmas" with our singing.

Worship concludes with the first stanza of *Joy to the World*. "While Isaac Watts did not write this text strictly for Christmas use, he did purposely cast his paraphrase of Psalm 98:4-9 in Christian terms, titling it 'The Messiah's coming and kingdom.' So 'the Lord' here is Jesus Christ, rather than the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob."

Additional information will be shared about other Christmas carols, hymns, and songs as we sing them this morning.

Adoration of the Three Kings - Landscape detail | Gentile da Fabriano | Public Domain

At the end of a long journey, the Magi arrive before the newly born Messiah, guided by a star, and they kneel before the Holy Family, offering their precious gifts. This detail of the Adoration of the Three Kings by Gentile da Fabriano focuses on some of the landscape of the journey. The tempera on wood dates to 1423 and shows extraordinary technical skills typical of the Renaissance.
