

For many of us, being in the dark of winter makes us long for sunshine, want to plan a trip down South, or look forward to vacationing in the summertime. But first we must get through the cold and storm of winter, the rain and mud of spring, and then we will finally get to enjoy those long warm summer days. We have to take each wintery day one at a time. Especially for us folks in Michigan, we've got to go through winter to get to spring. But one thing I love about a big storm is the chance to stay home and cozy up inside under a blanket. The storm can,

in a way, bring warmth; it can call attention to the important and often overlooked blessings of our lives.

And so it is in the church year as well: to get to Easter, we must first journey through Lent, which begins *Ash Wednesday* with services on March 2. There will be imposition of ashes at both the short midday service at noon and full service with Chancel Choir at 7pm. And that journey through Lent is what draws us in to a closer relationship with God. It is a time of reflection and introspection, as well as preparation for Good Friday and Easter, where we focus not just on our mortality and repenting from sin, but also on receiving God's mercy and love through the sacrifice of Jesus.

This Lenten season, we are focusing on the "Inward Journey Home," the idea that all this journeying and reflecting should lead us home to God—and in Christ's sacrifice for us on the cross, we all have a seat at the table in God's house. You will have many opportunities to explore this journey for yourself through the Lenten Daily Devotional, Lenten Art Series, the Midweek Meditation, and especially, I hope, with our Lenten musical offering, *Finding Home:* A Lenten Musical Journey on March 13 at 3pm. This program of music, readings, and meditation will highlight the many journeys we find ourselves on, both individually and collectively, as those who are lost and longing to find a refuge and home in God. As we share in this afternoon of music, featuring special guest pianist Alvin Waddles, Merideth Hite Estevez, and the Chancel Choir and soloists, our prayer is that one can find that glimmer of hope in the dark, of sun after a snow day, and that we may be one step closer to Home in God.

While a Dominican monk at San Marco's monastery in Florence, Fra Angelico was commissioned to paint frescoes in the meeting rooms and dormitory cells of the lay brothers, novices, and clergy. With the help of assistants, he painted more than 40 frescoes at San Marco, most of them depicting scenes of Christ's crucifixion. The *Transfiguration* was one of those paintings. The sparse fresco is intended to inspire its viewer to prayer and meditation.
