A Devotional from Pastor Angela

I have two stories in the Bible that always go straight to my heart and bring me to tears regardless of how many times I read them. One of them is John 21. (I'll just have to leave you guessing what the other story is!)

I can totally resonate with Peter when he says to the other disciples, "I'm going fishing," and they go with him. Peter had followed Jesus for three years, thinking he was the Messiah. But now, Jesus is gone. I can almost feel Peter's hopelessness and despair, as he thinks to himself, "What am I

going to do now?" And what do we do when we don't know how to go forward? We go backward to what we know how to do best. For Peter, that's fishing. Not only does he go back to his previous life of fishing, but he takes others with him. What's interesting is that the resurrected Jesus had appeared to Peter twice before this chapter! You would think his life would have been completely transformed after meeting the resurrected Jesus not only once but TWICE! And yet, here he is—going back to what he had been doing before—fishing. Not fishing for men but fishing for…well, fish. Just ordinary stinky fish.

Does Peter's story sound familiar to you? It sure does to me! Whenever Easter comes around, I take a stroll down the memory lane to the Easter Sunday when I was baptized. I was 15, and I can never forget the feeling of being reborn as the water of baptism rolled down my face. My spirit embraced the new life that was being granted to me along with my baptism, along with the resurrection of Jesus. Indeed, it was a tremendous day of joy and revival for me, and I thought, "This is it! I'll never go back to the person I used to be!" And then...I remember how I'd fall into hopelessness and despair from time to time, sometimes going back to the way I was, how I thought about myself, and doubting God's love for me. Perhaps not too different from Peter in the beginning of John 21.

So to this Peter who goes back to fishing, Jesus appears for the third time. Early morning, Jesus prepares breakfast for his disciples on the shores of Galilee. The charcoal on which Jesus is cooking fish is mentioned only one other time in the New Testament. It's the same charcoal Peter used to warm his hands in the courtyard where he denied Jesus three times. When Jesus appears to Peter in John 21, and asks, "Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?" (v.15), I imagine Jesus pointing to "THESE": the fishing net and all the fish they had just caught — the fisherman Peter used to be; I can imagine Jesus pointing to the charcoal—the traitor Peter believes himself to be. "Do you love me more than these?"

To truly encounter the risen Lord is to love Jesus more than who we were and think we are today in light of who we are called to be; new life and transformation happen when we allow Jesus to confront our past, so that we can embrace God's forgiveness, and live into the new call God has for us—day by day.

In his book, *Falling Upward*, Richard Rohr says this: "In the second half of the spiritual life, you are not making choices as much as you are being guided, taught, and led—which leads to "choiceless choices." These are the things you cannot *not* do because of what you have become, things you do not *need* to do because they are just not yours to do, and things you absolutely *must* do because they are your destiny and your deepest desire." What are your "choiceless choices" as you live into the new life that has been granted to you in the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ? May encountering the risen Lord this Easter Sunday and every day of your life lead you to your "choiceless choices" of being the love and light in your family, church, and the world today!

He is risen! He is risen indeed! Welcome to Easter Sunday, the Day of Resurrection, where we celebrate Christ's triumph over sin and death! Let us rejoice and sing with our hearts and minds as we praise God for all he has done to reconcile us to himself. Let us worship God – Alleluia!!

About today's Music

Christ the Lord Is Risen Today is a translation of a fourteenth-century Latin text. The tune was composed in 1708 and first appeared in Lyra Davidica, a Protestant hymnbook that was published in London which broadened congregational hymnody beyond the exclusive singing of the Psalms.

Now All the Vault of Heaven Resounds was written by Paul Z. Strodach, an American Lutheran pastor during the first half of the twentieth century who served parishes in New Jersey, Ohio and Pennsylvania. He was also active as a translator, as an author of manuals on liturgical and worship practices, as a hymnbook editor and for two decades was the literary editor for his denomination's publishing house. The tune *Lasst uns erfreuen* is well known and appears in our hymnal with three other texts.

Thine Is the Glory is a French hymn written in 1884 by Edmond Louis Budry, pastor of Free Church congregations in Cully and Vevey, Switzerland. The tune was composed by George Frideric Handel and comes from his oratorio Judas Maccabeus.

At the conclusion of both the 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. services is a full peal (random ringing) of five of the carillon's lowest bells; one of two times during the year when this is done, the other time being Christmas Eve at midnight. **The members of the brass ensemble are**: David Ammer, trumpet; Derek Lockhart, trumpet; Scott Strong, horn; David Binder, trombone; David Zerkel, tuba; Colin McCall, percussion.

About today's Anthems

Jesus Our Lord Is Risen Max Bruch The composer of the introit lived during the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, and while he was quite prolific as a composer, he is best known for his violin concertos.

Alleluia Randall Thompson The composer of this anthem served on the faculty of Harvard University during the mid-twentieth century. The text of this anthem is simply one word — "alleluia" — a word which comes from the Hebrew words hellēl, meaning "to praise" and Yāh, meaning "the Lord." It is the practice of many branches of the Church to refrain from using this word during the season of Lent so that its return on Easter Day to celebrate the Lord's resurrection has great significance and impact.

Light's Glittering Morn Bedecks the Sky Horatio Parker Horatio Parker was a leading American composer of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries and served as dean of the Yale University School of Music. The texts of this anthem are portions of translations of various ancient Latin hymns, a tradition which has had a huge impact on English hymnody. In their entirety these texts are of great length and are extensive recounts of the resurrection story.

Hallelujah, from *Messiah* George Frideric Handel This chorus is certainly the most well-known chorus from Handel's most well-known oratorio, and is a setting of Revelation 19:6, 11:15 and 19:16.
