

God also said to Moses, "Thus you shall say to the Israelites, 'The LORD, the God of your ancestors, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has sent me to you':

The most read, and probably most preached about Psalm is Psalm 23. It's a beautiful, poetic expression of faith and we usually use it for funerals, small gifts, or to recite in church. But how can it come alive for us, for Kirk in the Hills?

As we look to what the Kirk can be and do, can we truly say: "The LORD is my shepherd; I?" There are many needs in and for our church and surrounding communities like Pontiac. We have said farewell to many people we loved and find ourselves in transition--along with everything else, it seems! There are budgets to deal with, costs to control, ministry to expand, communication to

improve, poverty to address—the list goes on. The great paradox of our faith is that we will not even begin to address needs in us and others until we believe and proclaim—I lack nothing, "I shall not want." God has provided everything we need. This congregation has all the people it needs to do ministry in and for this community.

The other important message is that the LORD is the shepherd—our shepherd! The Kirk's vision and mission is not based on any one person's ideology or preferences or on the purview of a select group. It is given by God, empowered by God, and it is God in Christ Jesus who invites us in. In this way, we know that the work is good. It's not about "winning arguments" or seeming noble and righteous. It's about God's good, faithful, righteous work in Christ Jesus.

No matter how exhausted, inadequate, insecure, fearful, lost, and despondent you feel—God will restore your soul. The thing you've been looking for all your life--the ultimate satisfaction from your career, marriage, children, money, power, status, a sense of purpose, a higher meaning—can only be given by God and it's promised to you—only let your self be led by the Shepherd, "beside still waters."

There's so much more to say about this Psalm but I will end where it ends. "I will dwell in the House of the LORD forever!" The journey of faith isn't meant to be one you take alone. There's a community—the house image is about family, welcome, belonging. And this house is unlike any other house—where all are welcome, loved, and have a place at the table. This is a God big enough to welcome all of us in! Every house has a door and so the question for each one of us is: how can we each be doors to the House of the LORD? As we envision Bible Studies, small groups, Sunday worship, youth programming, and service projects Pontiac and Detroit, and as we engage with neighbors—how can we be doorways to the House of the LORD? What does it mean to be in the House of the LORD? It means the place where we are healed of our heart's wounds, the past that haunts us, the future that scares us, the present that weighs down on us and leads us to despair. It's the place where the broken places are put back together again, and we are made whole. It's the place of peace, justice, harmony, love, and never-ending joy. LORD, may it be so, for thy name's sake. Amen!

Worship/Music Notes

This morning we prepare ourselves for worship with the choir singing John Rutter's setting of *God be in my Head*, or the Sarum Prayer. This Old English Prayer, taken from the thirteenth century *Sarum Primer*, succinctly asks the Lord to guide us and mold our perceptions to reflect God's call for each of us.

Throughout the liturgy today we sing and hear of how God leads us – both as a Shepherd and King. These images could not be more stark, the humble Shepherd, but also the ever powerful King. The opening hymn *The King of Love My Shepherd* includes both of these images in the first line. The text, composed by Henry William Baker is a paraphrase of Psalm 23. It is notable that Baker includes several allusions to the New Testament, mentioning the cross in verse four and the chalice in verse five. The words to the beginning of the third verse "Perverse and foolish…." are believed to be the final words spoken by author Henry William Baker before his passing.

The choir continues to ponder the words of the twenty-third psalm with their anthem *My Shepherd Will Supply My Need* arranged by Mack Wilberg. This paraphrase of Psalm 23 is authored by Isaac Watts, notable not only for this hymn text, but also for authoring the words to *When I Survey the Wondrous Cross* and *Joy to the World*. The words offer an incredibly comforting image of God always providing for us, refreshing us, feeding us, and caring for us. The words poignantly remind us that God's promise is forever, and that some day we will enter into the Lord's house, "no more a stranger or a guest, but like a child at home".

Our second hymn, *Savior Like a Shepherd Lead Us* comes from a collection of hymn texts compiled for children called *Hymns for the Young* compiled in 1836. The words ask God, like a Shepherd to accept us despite our faults and cleanse and free us.

The choir also sings Benjamin Britten's joyous setting of Psalm 100 or the *Jubilate Deo*. This work, composed for St. George's Chapel, Windsor, at the request of H.R.H. The Duke of Edinburgh, uses frequent meter changes to make the sung rhythm more closely mirror that of how the words would be spoken. The anthem has a very festive, possibly even raucous feel to it. Despite that, Britten does have two moments that the texture changes - the passage that begins "be thankful unto him....", and the passage "world without end...". In these sections, the constant motion of the organ is removed, and the choir sings quietly underneath a stark accompaniment.

Our final hymn, *Praise my soul the King of Heaven* reminds us of the dual nature of God as our King, but also as a loving and gentle Father who "tends and spares us" and is "slow to chide, and swift to bless". This beloved hymn was the processional hymn sung at the wedding of Queen Elizabeth II in 1947. Through our liturgy this morning we celebrate and honor our Lord as King, and also celebrate His loving and care for us as a nurturing shepherd.
